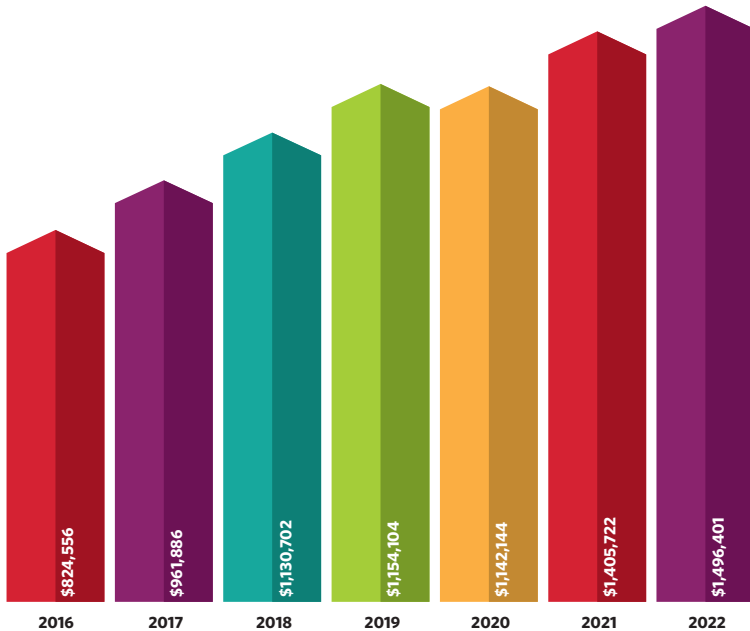

Fiscal year 2022 ended with total contributions of \$459,394 and a positive net income. **This is the 13th consecutive year of positive growth.** Nearly \$360,000 was granted via scholarships, program grants, and project awards. 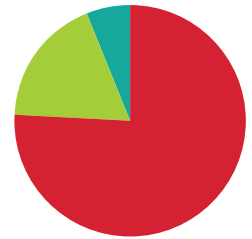
STEADY GROWTH OF ASSETS

In 2022, contributions to CRCSF were spent on:

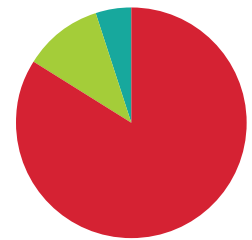
76% Programming
