

Vital Educational Partnership

Since 2006, The Giacoletto Foundation has partnered with the Cedar Rapids Community Schools Foundation to underwrite unmet needs for both schools and teachers. The John P. & Lawrence J. Giacoletto Foundation is the largest donor to the Cedar Rapids Community Schools Foundation, with a 2015 contribution of \$49,000 which funded School Project Grants. Seven School Project Grants were awarded in the spring to schools seeking larger capital needs. Grants funded in 2015 include:



SAFE Provides Extra-Curricular Support The SAFE (Sports, Academics, Fine Arts and Enrichment)

The SAFE (Sports, Academics, Fine Arts and Enrichment) Program offers financial assistance for at-risk and/or low-income District students to participate in extra-curricular activities. The Foundation believes that involvement in extra-curricular activities complements the District's academic curriculum and enhances students' educational experiences. This translates into positive student learning and development. Since its inception, the SAFE Program has provided more than \$50,000 to assist students with the fees associated with participating in extra-curricular programs throughout the District. This past year \$10,114.50 was distributed to nearly 100 students.

Anonymous Donor Funds Elementary Music Programs

For the past five years, an anonymous donor, through the Greater Cedar Rapids Community Foundation, has provided \$100 per elementary school for music teachers to purchase items needed to augment their in- class curriculum. This grant is in honor of long-time Coolidge Elementary School music teacher, Kathleen McNamara, who retired in 2011. The Foundation is thankful for this donor's continuing support for the important work of music education in the schools. Purchases have included such items as: an acoustic guitar, headphones, recorders, percussion instruments, and microphones.

Foundation Reports Successful Year

Fiscal year 2015 ended strong with total contributions of \$403,922. This is the sixth consecutive year of positive fund growth. Nearly \$205,000 was granted via scholarships, program grants, and project awards. The portfolio return in 2015 was positive 15%. Projections for the fiscal year 2016 operating budget include a \$24,200 surplus. The Foundation maintains three years of projected operating funds in CDs, cash, or money market investments. 

Children Served

In fiscal year 2015, a total of 15,668 children were served by various Foundation programs at a total financial investment of \$203,824.

Fiscal Agency Program
The Cedar Rapids Community Schools Foundation serves as the fiscal agent for many fine programs that have a relationship with the CRCSD. Partnering with the Foundation allows these organizations to focus on carrying out their missions, knowing their funds are being professionally managed. Each group is individually governed, yet has access to the fiduciary services and benefits of a nonprofit foundation, as requested.

This past year, the Foundation managed funds for the following organizations: Jeanne Sentman Literature Fund, Jefferson Grateful Grannies, Metro Student Achievement Fund, The Academy for Scholastic & Personal Success, the Homeless Program, and Iowa BIG. During FY2015 the following new fiscal agent programs were added: The Bookhouse Fund and Partnership for Post-Secondary Success.

District Supports the Foundation via **Charitable Giving**

Fiscal year 2015 saw the staff of the Cedar Rapids Community School District support the Foundation with more than \$30,000 in donations via the Annual Charitable Community Campaign/Staff Payroll Deduction program. That sum is 10% of the Foundation's annual budget! Every dollar given by faculty and staff goes to help underwrite the Foundation's many programs. The commitment of employees – teachers, counselors, administrators, bus drivers, secretaries, or principals -- speaks to their understanding of the important role the Foundation plays in the financial health of the District.
